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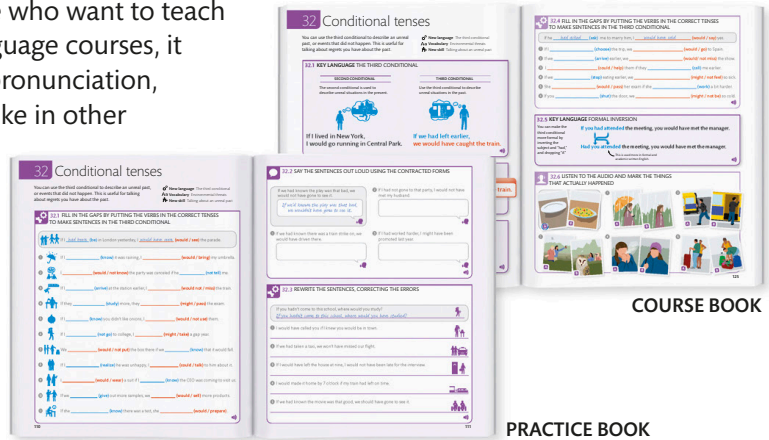
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How the course works

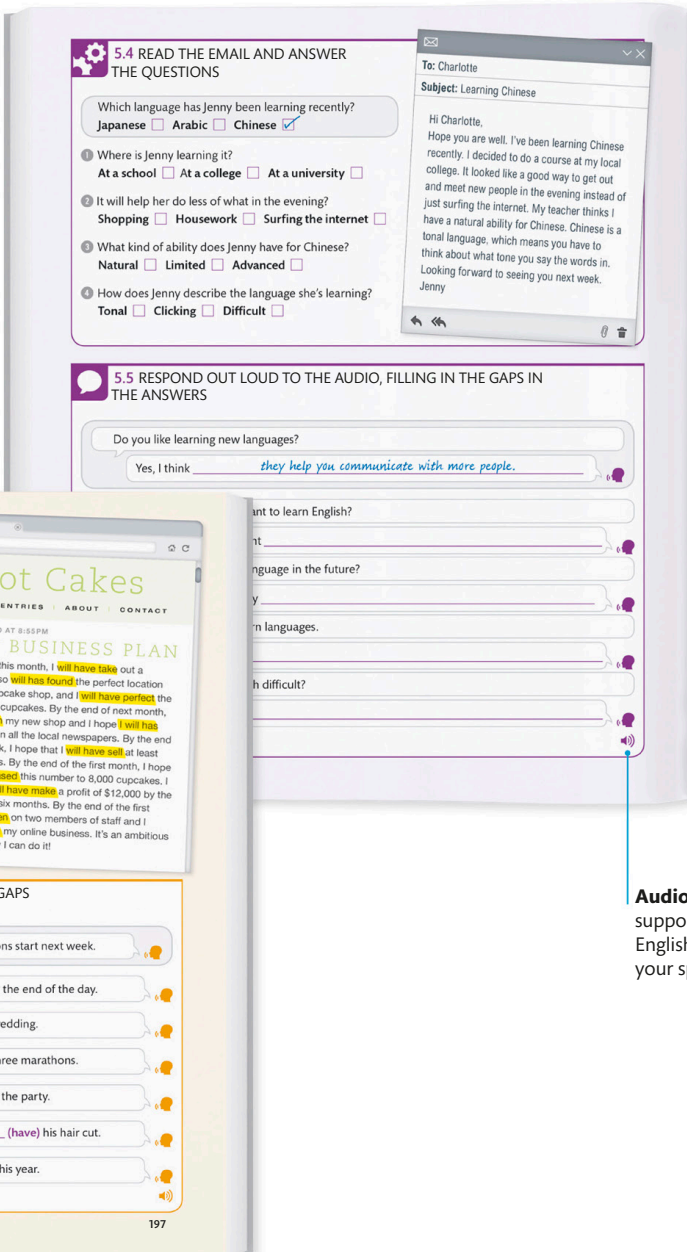

ENIGMA FOREVER

Seventy years on, the mystery of Amelia endures

Amelia Earhart, one of the first female aviators, has been missing since 1937. She was attempting a round-the-world flight when, on July 2 1937, her plane disappeared over the Pacific Ocean. Despite a huge search effort, no body or wreckage was ever found.

Opinions are divided as to what happened to Amelia. Jack Berger, an aviation expert, firmly believes that the plane ran out of fuel and crashed into the ocean, where Amelia drowned. Berger's reasonable theory is poles apart from other, more outlandish,

explanations. For example, another popular belief is that Amelia ditched her plane on purpose, and went to spy on the Japanese. Even more unlikely is that she completed the round-the-world trip, but didn't want to be in the spotlight anymore, so moved

to a small town in the US and changed her name.

It seems extremely unlikely that we will ever know for sure what happened to Amelia. What is not a matter of opinion however, is that Amelia was declared dead in 1939, despite no body ever being found.

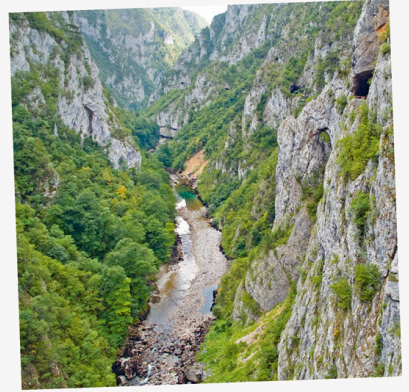


TIMELY RESCUE

Pete Falconer recounts his harrowing experience in California

Pete Falconer has been mountain climbing since he was seven years old. The 32 year old thought that he had seen everything and was prepared for any situation, but one day that all changed. It was a hot August day in California and Pete was out climbing with a group of friends. "That day started just like any other. If you'd have told me what was going to happen later on, I would never have believed you," Pete told us. He decided to move ahead of the rest of the group and started climbing up the face of a mountain known as The Antelope. If he'd stayed with the others, they would have been able to reach him faster or

even catch hold of him to stop him falling, but Pete was out there all alone when he lost his footing and fell down into a canyon. "I knew right away that my leg was broken," Pete continued. 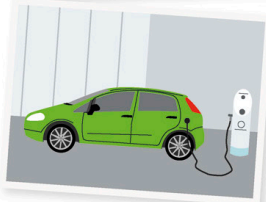

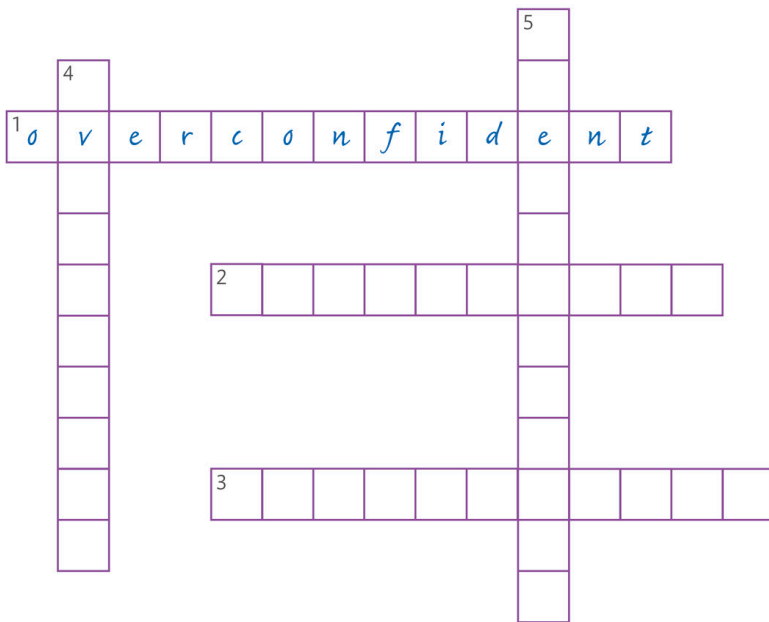

Food security

Explaining food security and related concepts

One of the big issues facing governments around the world this century is food security. Just in case you've never **heard for** it before, when we **talk over** food security, we mean a state where everyone has access to an amount of food that is **suitable of** their needs. Those of us lucky enough to be food secure should be **grateful over** it because a lot of people live in a state of food insecurity and this number is set to grow. Long-term food insecurity **leads in** hunger and large-scale food-insecurity becomes famine when it has the **effect at** forcing more than 20 percent of a country's population to live without the food they need.

Experts can't **agree for** exactly how many people worldwide are food insecure, but the evidence **points at** the direction of it being over 1.2 billion and we're likely to see an **increase of** that number in the years to come.

The expression "food desert" refers to places with limited access to healthy, nutritious food. "Food deserts" tend to be low-income areas and are found in developed as well as developing countries. People living in "food deserts" become used to this **lack in** choice and, even when there is an option, they're more likely to **ask of** a burger and chips than a fresh salad at a restaurant. It's almost as if



they're **afraid over** healthy eating. The results are high obesity levels as people eat large amount of high-fat and high-sugar foods with little nutritional value. Social factors may be to blame in developed countries and especially the **decline of** the number of families who sit down together to eat a home-cooked meal.

Politicians have **argued on** what the best way to deal with food security is, but they haven't reached a consensus on what action to take yet.
